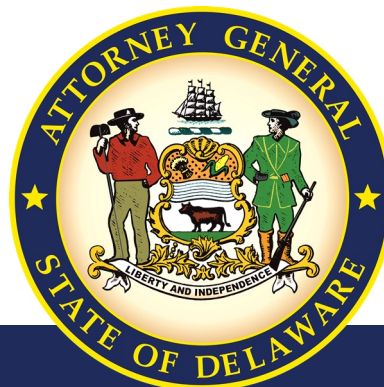

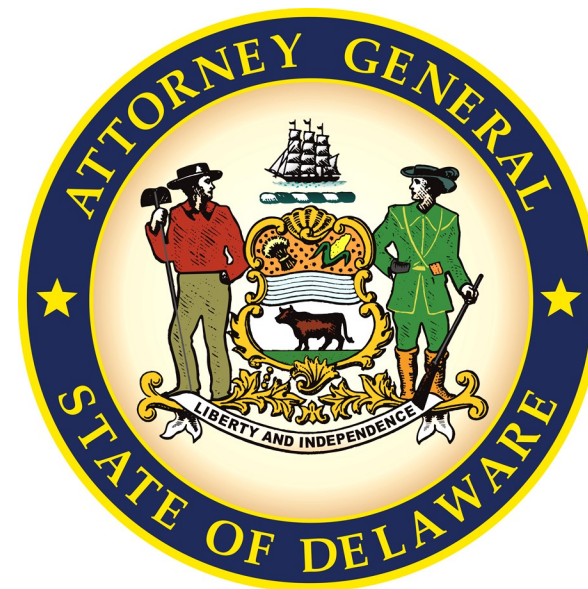

## What is the Community Engagement Unit?

The Department of Justice created the Community Engagement Unit (“CEU”) to encourage collaboration with communities statewide to prevent and reduce crime and to build trust between the Attorney General’s Office and the communities it serves. The CEU works directly with residents in an effort to create safer communities. The CEU members attend community meetings, meet with concerned residents individually, volunteer with outreach programs, tutor/mentor school-aged children and host events that aim to support and uplift the community.

In addition to working with the community, the CEU coordinates with law enforcement and municipalities to ensure effective enforcement measures are utilized to address neighborhood specific concerns.

## What does Community Engagement do?

Here are some programs that the CEU is currently working on.

### “What’s Next” Series:

- A series of forums for families of soon-to-be released and recently-released individuals
- Encourages family members to engage in an “expectations” dialogue
- Lets families know about the resources that are available to them
- Teaches people how to navigate the complex range of emotions that come with re-entry
- Held throughout the year and across the state

### Community Walks:

- The CEU goes on walks through neighborhoods throughout the city of Wilmington along with other groups
- Makes sure that members of the Department of Justice know what is going on in the community
- Members of the unit can directly answer questions and provide resources to members of the community

### Community Resource Fairs:

- Fairs held in parks throughout Wilmington that let people know about resources available to them
- Also include food, drinks, live music, and fun activities like moon bounces, face-painting, and haircuts
